Dear Friends,

Change is in the air. With the seismic political change from the July general election still fresh in our minds, August too brings change . right here in our own parishes!

At Welford on the evening 29th July Reverend Tom is launched into ministry with our seven church group by Archdeacon Richard and our new Diocesan leader Bishop Debbie. On Sunday 4th August he will lead his first service with us at 10:30am in All Saints Church, Clipston.

We may have received the recent change of government with celebration or deep foreboding. Yet, while change is often unwelcome, it can open the way to good things . to fresh hope and new opportunities. That the how I see the coming of a new vicar to our churches. Ion convinced that God has led him here and that his arrival creates opportunities . opportunities that I hope and pray will lead to a brighter future for church life in our benefice.

Now youqd be forgiven for thinking the church is resistant to change. The old joke asks How many Church Wardens does it take to change a light bulb?qThe response: £hange?!q

In a rapidly-changing world that full of uncertainty, our stone-built medieval buildings and our services with their familiar phrases, with the hymns we learnt at school, are a meaningful source of comfort -. a reassuring bastion of stability.

But this familiarity and settledness is a million miles from how the church started! Jesus challenged and disrupted the religious patterns of his day, frequently finding himself in contention with the religious leaders!

Most importantly, Jesus brought change to peoplesqlives. He confronted injustice. He challenged privilege and entitlement. He fed the hungry and healed the sick. He spent time with poor and disadvantaged people. He brought them hope and a future. As he said: *'I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full.'*

The message of Jesus was totally relevant to the issues that concerned the people of his day. If he had been standing for election, he would surely have delivered a \pm upermajorityq. though not without entrenched opposition from vested interests. But it wasn**q** political power he sought. Jesusqaim was to bring love to the hearts of ordinary people \tilde{o} radical love that changed their lives and through them impacted the community around them.

God \mathfrak{g} work is still about change \tilde{o} change for the better in the lives of people like you and me. With change in the air, we can dream about the future.

In the Old Testament there are words that encourage us to look ahead: 'I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert.'

We rightly honour and respect our history. We take genuine and reassuring comfort in the familiarity of what we have inherited. On that secure foundation we look for change õ *more love, more justice, more hope* for the people our benefice churches are here to bless. As the old hymn says, 'We'll praise Him for all that is past, and trust Him for all that's to come.'

With God¢ help and with our support and encouragement, may Revd Tom have the joy of leading us in bringing blessing into the lives of people living in our seven parishes, leading to much-needed renewal and growth.
